
2024-2025 DOLLAR COUNT

These numbers capture individual instances in which local United Way Partner Agencies provided support in the areas of Financial Security and Basic Needs, Healthy Community, and Youth Opportunity between July 1, 2024, and June 30, 2025.



This count is necessarily duplicated at times. For example, a person needing basic needs for food or shelter may be in this situation because of a health issue or loss of a job. A child needing extra help in school may be experiencing anxiety or depression. United Way agencies offer wrap-around services in several areas to help a person achieve stability.

PARTNER AGENCY IMPACT STORIES

HEALTHY COMMUNITY INITIATIVE

Healthy Community Initiative (HCI) helped make possible the grand opening of a second location of Little Scholars Academy in Faribault. The center will serve up to 77 children, providing families with safe, high-quality childcare and strengthening the local workforce. The expansion was the result of a collaboration between Faribault Cares, HCI, and the Faribault Area Chamber of Commerce, whose leadership helped spotlight how expanded childcare access creates broader economic impact for businesses as well as families.



PROJECT ABLE

Project ABLE gives adults with disabilities opportunities to learn, grow, and friendships. With United Way's support, registrations more than doubled, from 1,046 to 2,773. Events like Pizza Bingo, community dinners, dances, and outings to the Paradise Center for the Arts, the Minnesota Twins. and the Sea Life Aguarium offered participants vital connection, joy, and belonging.

THE KEY

For many young people, The Key-operated by Northfield Union of Youth-is more than a drop-in space; it's where they find stability, connection, and hope. The Key's art programming, weekly meals at Youth Board meetings, bonfires, and events like the Hot Wing Challenge give young people safe opportunities to express themselves, build friendships, and gain the confidence to take the next step toward a stronger future. This past year, NUY's Wallflower Project and Wallflower House supported youth experiencing homelessness.

UNITED WAY HIGHLIGHTS DOLLY PARTON'S IMAGINATION LIBRARY

United Way proudly sponsors the Dolly Parton Imagination Library, a program which sends a free book every month to Rice County area children from birth through age 5. The 2025 Dolly Book Bash raised enough funds to provide free books to 1,700 local children.

UNITED WAY REBOUND PARTNERS MICROGRANTS

Microgrants give up to \$1,000 to address urgent, community-based challenges or new initiatives supporting underserved populations. Recent grantees include Faribault's Future Class of 2025, Clean River Partners, Rice County Neighbors United, and Ruth's House.

PICKLE PADDLE

United Way's first ever Pickle Paddle, a pickleball tournament, raised over \$8,000. All proceeds will support Rice County Healthy Community partner agencies. These agencies support Rice County's most vulnerable neighbors by providing direct mental and physical healthcare, prevention education, in-home care for older adults, and transportation to medical appointments.



2-1-1 UNITED WAY HOTLINE

United Way 211 provides free and confidential health and human services information for people in Rice County 24 hours a day, 7 days a week. In 2024, 479 local people made 810 requests to ask 211 for help. The top areas of support 211 provided were Housing, Utilities, Legal/Public Safety, and Mental Health.



BOOKS ON CENTRAL

has flourished since opening in October 2023 at 227
Central Avenue in Faribault. Our dedicated volunteers
contributed over 4,000 hours this year, curating and selling
more than 11,000 books annually, with 30% focused on children and young adult
literature—directly supporting United Way's literacy focus while making reading

United Way's all-volunteer bookstore, Books on Central,

accessible to families throughout our community.

This year, Books on Central raised over \$35,000 in net sales—a 75% increase from our first nine months – with every dollar flowing directly to United Way's Partner Agencies. Through literary events featuring local authors, poets, and historians, we're fostering a vibrant reading culture that strengthens community literacy. Books on Central demonstrates how volunteer passion and community generosity create sustainable impact for local families and nonprofits.
